Annual Report: 2008-2009

Highlights of My Sister's House 2008-2009 fiscal year

(July 1, 2007 - June 30, 2008)

- Provided 2281 nights of shelter, utilities, food, and case management services to 49 largely Asian/Pacific Islander women and children fleeing abuse.
- Assisted 501 recorded callers this year, an increase of 4% from the previous year.
- Provided the Women to Work Program for 85+ survivors of domestic violence to help them rebuild their lives financially.
- Through a partnership with the Asian Bar Association of Sacramento, provided legal assistance to more than 30 survivors.
- Gave certificates of completion to I 6 new shelter advocates.
- Held 5th annual Run for a Safe Haven during which more than 808 people took

- (continued) a stand against domestic violence.
- Hosted the Heroes of Hope 4th Volunteer Appreciation Dinner honoring Fred Teichert, Elk Grove Police Department, Cheryl Louie, Mindstorm Creative, and Lions District 4-C5. This sold out event was attended by 400+ individuals.
- Provided more than 32 presentations, including a special training on human trafficking.
- Participated in more than a dozen community fairs, and reached out to more than 4122 individuals with information to help prevent domestic violence.
- Aided more than 15 mothers and 52 children with mental health support sessions.
- Provided a special legal workshop for Japanese, South Asian, and Muslim women.
- Created a new strategic plan.
- Worked with San Joaquin Women's Center and Casa de Esperanza (Yuba, Sutter, and Colusa Counties) to foster cultural competencies.
