Highlights of My Sister's House 2018-2019 Fiscal Year

- Provided 6,706
 (Emergency shelter,
 Transitional Houses,
 and Hotel stay nights
 of shelter, utilities,
 food, and case
 management services
 to 131 Asian Pacific
 Islanders and other
 women and children
 fleeing abuse.
- Helped with safety planning and provided information to over
 2,965 people.
- Gave certificates of completion to 45 new shelter advocates.
- Assisted more than 445 women in our Women to Work Program.
- Created and/or improved the resumes of more than 45 domestic violence survivors.
- Helped 30 survivors of violence obtain jobs or promotions.
- Served almost **14,500** customers at My
 Sister's Café, many learning about My
 Sister's House for the first time.

- Provided more than 100 presentations regarding domestic violence and human trafficking, educating almost 2,109 people.
- Assisted 417 domestic violence victims with restraining orders, child custody, immigration and other legal issues.
- Served **20** human trafficking victims.
- Hosted a Human Trafficking conference with 400 law enforcement and social service providers.

Funder Highlights

My Sister's House received two special federal grants which were a big part of My Sister's House 2018-2019 fiscal year.







One of those grants was for My Sister's House Project REACH. which stood for Reach Each Asian/Pacific Islander Community with Hope. This project enabled My Sister's House to address sexual assault and domestic violence issues at UC Davis and Yolo County, working in conjunction with Empower Yolo, Yolo County's sexual assault and domestic violence center. My Sister's House was able to develop a partnership with UC Davis' Asian American Studies and its International Student Center. We also worked with local ethnic newspapers, radio stations, church newsletters, TV stations, and social media influencers to provide culturally-specific outreach. As a result, My Sister's House crisis line doubled its calls from Yolo County this past year.
